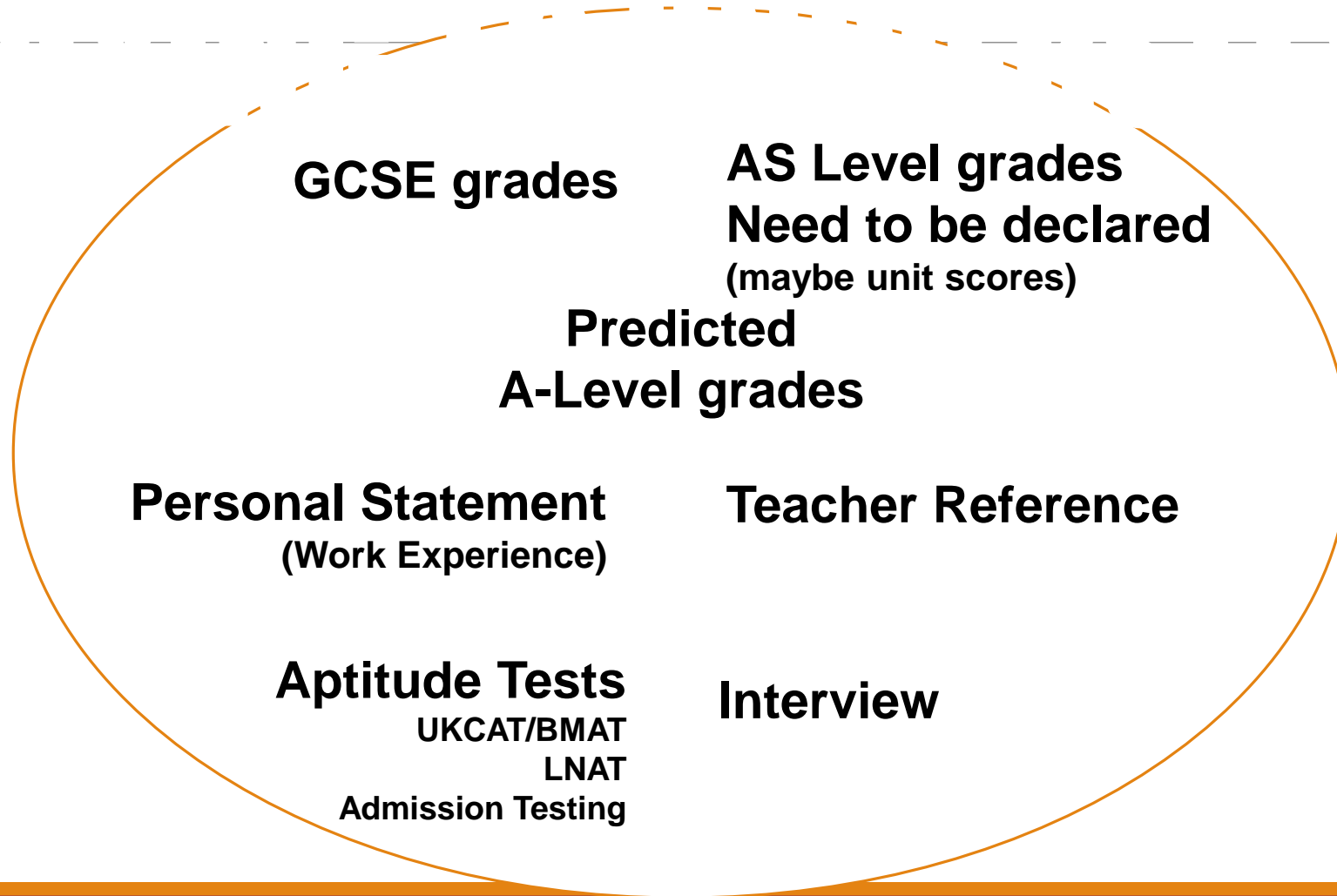

Personal statement

Most importantly it is your chance to sell yourself to your University.

For courses that don't require interviews or aptitude tests as part of their admissions process – it is your only chance to establish an applicant-university point of contact.

We have included some exemplar statements.

Basis for interview

Anti-plagiarism software

Demonstrate a real interest in the subject. It is really important to focus a significant amount of the statement on your chosen subject and to detail what you have read or participated in to evidence a genuine interest in it. For example, by reading around the subject area, talking to someone in the relevant profession or gaining some relevant work experience. 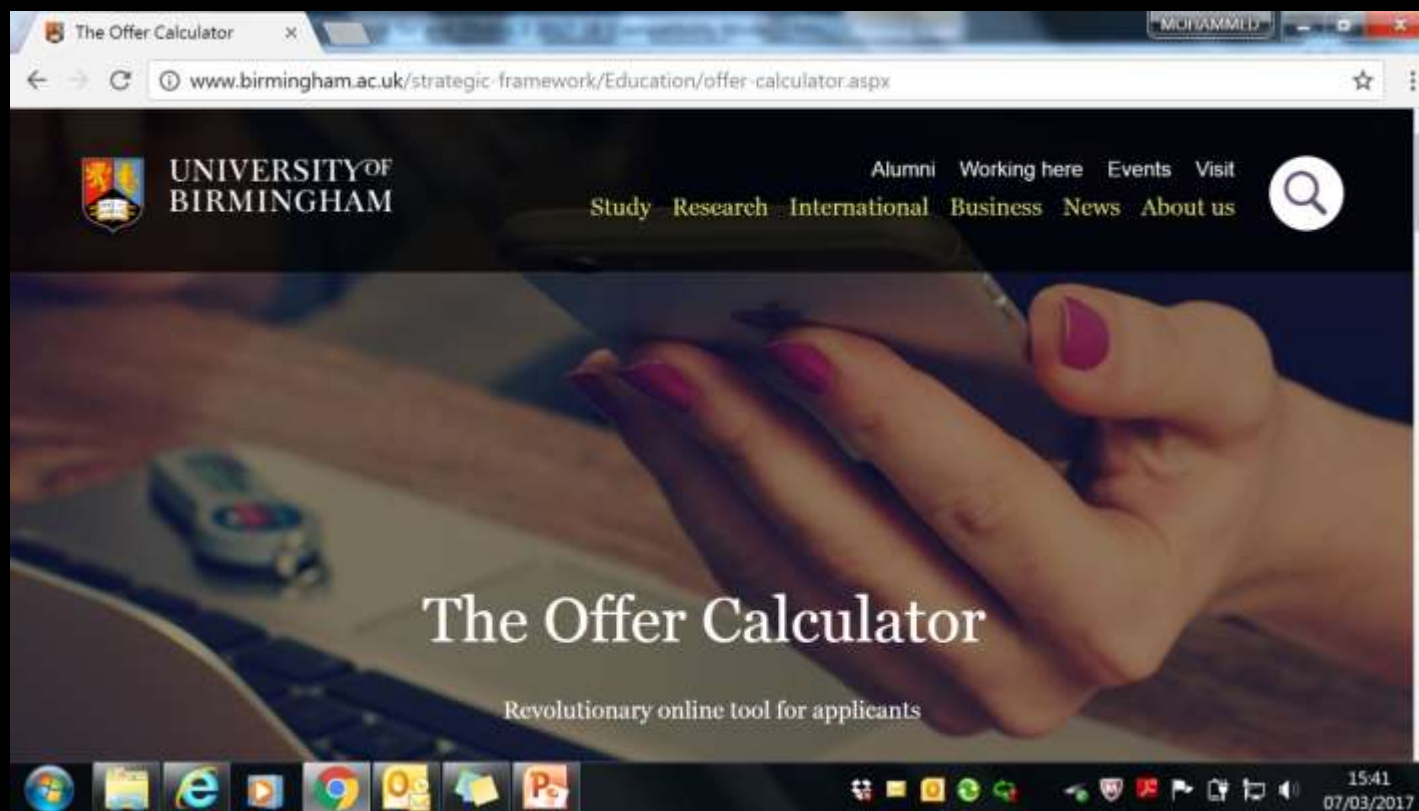

How do degree apprenticeships work?

Degree apprentices achieve a full Bachelors or Masters degree but avoid the colossal debts from tuition fees and maintenance loans.

Degree apprentices are employed throughout the programme, completing paid work from day one.

funding for degree apprenticeships is divided between the government and your employer.

The government pays two-thirds of your costs and fees, capped at £18,000, while your employer coughs up the rest.

Apprentices will work for a minimum of 30 hours a week for 30 weeks a year.

Degree apprentices will be expected to achieve academically while they are in full-time employment.

do not guarantee a permanent job

apprentices are highly employable graduates. Building a relationship with an employer over a programme of work and study will open doors into an industry.

Retention rates for apprentices can exceed 80%. (UCAS, 2016)

Degree Apprenticeships – Did you know?

- 61% of parents would prefer to see their child embark on a degree apprenticeship with a leading British employer than an Oxbridge degree.
- 81% of parents think a degree apprenticeship would provide their children with a better chance of getting a job than going to university.
- 78% of parents believed degree apprenticeships were better value for money than a traditional university degree. Even if money were no object, 62% of parents would rather their child did a degree apprenticeship.
- Before the study, only 13% of parents had heard of degree apprenticeships.

Sponsored Degrees

students can get work experience at the company while they study

a qualification that will enhance their skillsets

become graduates who know more about their work

work with the company during holidays or part time

study at university for a degree related to your job for the rest of the time

It's much the same way that apprenticeships work but instead of a NVQ, you will end up with a degree

advantage of employer sponsored degrees is that you not only get a salary

but you also get 3 years of building up valuable work experience

School Leaver Programmes

School leaver programmes were created to provide an alternative route for A-level students, who otherwise may have ventured down the purely academic path of university.

School leaver programmes are apprenticeships that are aimed at students in year 13
a middle ground between full-time employment and higher education.

a healthy balance between work and study

Companies sponsor, or part-sponsor students to study towards qualifications that are relevant to the business or industry they work within

you get a salary

School Leaver Programmes

The structure of these programmes are similar to sponsored degree programmes.

The structure is similar in the way in which blocks of study are combined with work placements in a company.

The arrangements for study blocks and work placements are dependent on each company.

BDO's school leaver programme use external tutor firms to train their accountancy students.

KPMG school leavers spend an entire year at university before returning for work placements.

This is why school leaver programmes are so exciting. The variety. The mystery.

a popular option among school leavers

it allows having a break overseas after studies

putting some valuable experience on the CV

most students are excited by the chance to see the world

Volunteering, Summer Camps, TEFL. Some could even see you earning money

UK-based volunteer and charity work programmes

more accurate to class a gap year as simply a time to try something new, get away from the 'reality' of life at home and develop as a person



How does a gap year scheme work?

can last for as long as you like and be done anywhere at any time

get involved in a number of different projects in different places

OR just want to jump on a plane, head off to an exotic location and find work, jobs or volunteering opportunities along the way

companies out there like Frontier designed to help you find structured gap year work experiences and voluntary experiences abroad

What is enrichment?

Enrichment is... 'anything that someone chooses to do outside of school which is of benefit to themselves or others'.

For one week (July 10th-14th 2017) students are off timetable.
