How to revise in Year 7

All students need to engage in meaningful and structured revision. This can be a bit of a daunting task and can quite quickly become very boring. Encouraging them to revise effectively at home, for tests, assessments and exams can be tricky but effective revision is vital to achieve the very best levels and grades. Below are some ideas and techniques that your son might find useful when revising for his End of Year Examinations.

Test them...

Get them to create a set of flash cards for you to use. Make it fun and challenging- how many can they get right in a row? This also allows you to help them work through the ones they don't get right or struggle with. It also helps you to check that they are working at a higher enough level to achieve the top levels.

Revision cards...

Ask them to condense their notes into smaller and smaller forms. Can they manage to reduce one topic to a single side of A3? Or a few key points on a post card? This helps them to identify and remedy their weaknesses as you discard the things you already are confident on.

Mind Maps...

Starting in the centre of a large piece of paper, students map out all of their ideas and show how their notes link together. Using colours, shapes and symbols are also excellent tools to categorise and organise information.

Keywords...

Why not try getting your son to reduce topic areas to sets of keywords? You can then ask him to explain all of his knowledge relating to that one key word.

Mnemonics...

Despite the off-putting name, these are really very simple. Just take the first letter of the things you need to remember and create a new word or phrase.

Never **E**at **S**hredded **W**heat
My **V**ery **E**asy **M**ethod **J**ust **S**peeds **U**p
Naming **P**lanets

Memory trails...

Locating information along a route makes it easy to remember. It doesn't have to be a long journey. Let them put facts on post-its and stick them up around the house- on a mirror, going up the stairs, around their bedroom walls. It is surprising how much easier it becomes to remember when you retrace the route later in your memory

MP3...

If your child is always listening to music, what else could they be listening to instead? Revision notes? Podcasts? Stories? Poems? A recording of a lesson?

There are all kinds of resources available on-line. This also takes the stigma out of revision because no one knows what you're listening to!

YouTube...

Although it can be a source of mindless time-wasting, if your child loves YouTube, it can become a valuable revision tool. There are lots of films, TV clips and videos that directly relate to lots of topics. Just make sure that your child, as with any source of information they come across, is evaluating the information they find. As with all student internet usage, we encourage parents to consult the CEOP website and to install software that allows parental controls so that students are safe online at all times. Even better, why not get them to create their own revision videos?

The brackets next to each topic contain the sections of the 1C textbook in which that topic can be found.

Question 1 - List 4 things from the text. Read the question noting the specified section of the source you need to find the answer from (e.g. lines 1-7 only)

Question 2- How does the writer use language? You must follow the MEE formula (Method, evidence, effect) Based on only a section of the extract (e.g. lines 8-19)

Question 3- How does the writer structure the text to interest the reader? You should refer to the whole extract.

Question 4- You will be given a statement from a student and you will be asked to what extent you agree - always agree. Use the MEE formula for each paragraph.

Can you also explain why a source might be reliable/unreliable?

You need to make sure you examine who has written/drawn the source and when it was written - would this make it trustworthy?

Is the person writing likely to be biased?

Does the source state facts or does it exaggerate? Etc.

You have sheets and assessments in your book that will help you with this

The exam will consist of some short answer questions i.e. facts, some essay questions i.e. similar to your assessments on Hastings and Elizabeth and some source skills i.e. similar to your Braveheart assessment



1. The exam takes the form of **four** sections: i) 30 Multiple choice questions ii) AT2 Question iii) AT1 Evaluation question iv) Storyboard
2. The multiple choice questions must be answered on the grid that you will be provided with. You must shade in the box that corresponds with the correct answer. If you shade in more than one box your answer will be marked as incorrect. **Use a pencil and ensure you have an eraser with you.**
3. With the AT2 question you will be expected to explain an important element of your learning from the year. You must choose **one** question from the 4. Write your answer in the exam booklet. All answers must be in full sentences.
4. The AT1 evaluation question is designed to test whether you can reflect upon your learning. You must choose **one** question from the 4. You will be expected to write using paragraphs and support your answer with appropriate evidence and opinions.
5. The storyboard task will require you to draw a three frame storyboard that illustrates elements of your learning. The instructions will tell you what to do.
6. Make sure you revise your learning from this year (use your workbook and the library).
